## Many Factors Lead To A Critical Situation For Zeta Psi

Brothers:

As you can see from the reports of the undergraduates and the news flowing from Hanover, the combined effects of Minimum Standards, delayed rush, and enforcement of rigid alcohol policies are creating a critical situation for fraternities at Dartmouth, including Zeta Psi. While the successes of this year's rush and satisfactory compliance with Minimum Standards have removed the spotlight from our house, we cannot pretend that these problems don't affect us.

The reduced membership resulting from delayed rush, together with the increased cost of meeting Minimum Standards, has prevented the undergraduates from making timely rent payments to the elder corporation. These payments are calculated on the basis of property taxes, mortgage

payments, and other operational costs. There is no cushion or excess, nor is there an endowment into which we can dip.

Therefore, as has been the case in the past and is more so now, we need your support in order to continue to pay our bills. The generosity of some of our elders has been phenomenal, and we thank them again. Just as significant, however, are the small, occasional contributions from many others, which allow us to meet our obligations on a timely basis. Anything you wish to give will be greatly appreciated and will help us remain in a position to choose what course to take rather than having the decisions made for us by others.

Clearly, the '93 class of Zetes is a strongly, tightly bound group. All are eagerly awaiting their sophomore summer and a chance to run the house on their own.
